 - a. Psalm 102:25-26

4. Christ will “remain in heaven until the time comes for God to restore everything” (Acts 3:21)... not “destroy” everything and start over
5. The context of 2 Peter 3:10
 - a. The earth was “destroyed” through water in the Flood
 - b. The flood was cataclysmic and devastating, but didn’t obliterate it and cause it to cease to exist
 - c. A small group of people (Noah and his family) and the animals were rescued in order to re-inhabit the new world made ready by God’s cleansing judgment
 - d. This next time it will be “destroyed” through fire, which will permanently eliminate sin
 - e. In the same way, it won’t make the New Earth uninhabitable
 - f. “Burned up” could also be translated “laid bare” or “exposed” and was done that way in the earlier Greek manuscripts

The meaning of “new”

6. “Heaven and earth” is the entire universe (Revelation 21:1)
7. “New” is not used as “new as opposed to the old”, but as
“
_____”

8. The idea is that the “old” has become obsolete and should be replaced by what is “new” (i.e. – New Covenant)
 - a. Understood better is that when we accept Christ we have “become a new creation, old things have passed away, behold new things have come” (2 Corinthians 5:17)
 - b. Resurrection is about continuity... the same body which was destroyed is reconstructed into the new
 - c. God will re-gather all He needs from a scorched and disfigured Earth and raise it to become the New Earth... the “destruction” will be temporal and partial, but the renewal will be eternal and complete
 - d. The earth’s death is no more final than our own!
 - e. Earth’s fiery “end” will open straight into a glorious new beginning!!
