Introduction

Four Criteria to Defining an Individual's Sexuality³

1C: Using our list (old and new), these passages, and our summary statements, **read** the case study below as a table and **identify** fitting responses to each study. We'll share our responses with the class.

Jack and Jenny recently joined your small group; a couple in their early 30's, they've been married for nearly ten years, and are expecting twins in a few months. Jenny, an esteemed and tenured physics professor at a nearby college, makes significantly more than her husband Jack, a computer programmer for a national technology firm. When the baby arrives in four months, their plan is for Jack to stay home with their twins and for Jenny to continue working, seeing that Jack's salary would not be adequate to support their new family. Jenny's schedule is flexible, and Jack will work part-time from home. In the long term, Jack would like to homeschool their kids while Jenny continues to work.

After a recent sermon series on gender and sexuality, Jenny and Jack are confused. They were told that to be masculine is to lead, provide for, and protect women and to be feminine is to affirm, receive, and nurture the strength and leadership of men. This has created some tension for them. They come to you after small group to seek your counsel. After the group has left, Jack tells you that they are afraid that going through with their plan will violate God's Word. Jenny, starting to cry, tells you that she's never felt so insecure as a woman as she did after that sermon series--she's always felt that this was what God wanted for them. With eager and humble expectation, Jenny and Jack are looking to you to for biblical counsel and guidance.

A Note on The Learning

For this semester's Hot Topics series, Kyle and Stephanie will be utilizing the principles and practices of **Dialogue Education** to learn <u>with</u> you. Jesus is who, the how, and the why of our learning.

Our hope is that as we learn <u>together</u> you are able to take your learning to your life in order to be conformed to Christ. This is our hope, and prayer: that through our time together Christ would be formed in you (Galatians 4:19).

In light of this, we commit to come to class each week prepared, with the necessary materials for our learning in-tow, so that meaningful, Christ-centered learning can take place. We invite you to come to each session ready to learn: to engage in learning tasks, to answer questions, and to experience the joy of learning together. Remember: joy is the measure.
